Orange barrels, cones and signs are popping up across the state like flowers in springtime, signaling the start of a new construction season. For Michigan drivers, orange cones are a signal to be extra cautious when navigating work zones. Patience can run thin, or drivers can be tempted by distractions. Both can lead to crashes, injuries and deaths for road workers.

The Ingham County Road Department encourages motorists to follow these safe driving tips provided by the Michigan Work Zone Safety Task Force:

- Expect Changes Work zone speed limits are usually reduced. Traffic lanes may change, and workers, vehicles, or equipment may enter the traffic lane unexpectedly.
- Minimize Distractions Don't use cell phones or engage n distracting activities. Lives are at stake.
- Obey Workers and Signs Road crews know what is best for moving traffic safely. Follow all signs and instructions to merge, slow down or stop.
- Don't Speed or Tailgate Fines double for speeding in a Michigan work zone. Slow down! Keep a safe distance between you and the vehicle ahead of you.
- Pay Attention Vehicles may slow, stop or change lanes unexpectedly. Watch for brake lights and be prepared to react to traffic.
- **Be Patient and Calm** Work zones are a necessary step to improve our roads and make your future drive better.


It only takes a split second of distraction to change a road worker's life forever. Don't become a statistic. Give work zones your undivided attention. Slow down and obey all road signs.

A Message from the Director

As we gear up for another bustling construction season, I wanted to take a moment to share with you how our work and construction projects are funded, as there is often a misconception that resident property taxes cover road expenses.

Funding for Michigan's roads primarily comes from the Michigan Transportation Fund (MTF), which is allocated to entities such as the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT), County Road Commissions/Departments, and local municipalities (Cities/Villages). However, these revenue streams have failed to keep pace with the escalating costs of infrastructure upkeep.

For decades Michigan's roads have faced chronic underfunding, posing significant challenges to maintaining and enhancing transportation



infrastructure. Similar to what many are experiencing with their own personal finances, the Road Department has encountered the escalating costs of materials, labor, and equipment essential for road construction and maintenance, further increasing the funding shortfall. The state's aging infrastructure has endured years of wear and tear, exacerbated by severe winters and heavy traffic. Consequently, numerous roads and bridges are in a state of disrepair, necessitating substantial financial investment.

So, what can we do to combat this issue we face?

Grants play a crucial role in our efforts at the ICRD to secure additional funding for road improvements. This year, we diligently applied for grants from various sources to bolster our initiatives. Some grant applications include*:

Legislature Changes. Without alternative revenue sources, the rise of EVs could lead to a decline in funding for road maintenance and construction. Some states are already exploring solutions like mileage-based fees and road usage charges. In Michigan, proactive planning is vital to secure sustainable funding for transportation infrastructure amidst increasing EV adoption.

Until funding sources align with the needs required to repair our infrastructure, we'll continue to explore creative avenues for securing additional funds and maximizing the utilization of available resources. Our commitment remains steadfast in improving Ingham County roads for the betterment of the community.



Did you Know?

The term pothole originated in the 15th/16th century when local potters would dig up clay from ruts in the roads created by coach wheels, these holes became known as potholes.

Nowadays potholes are the product of weather changes, trapped moisture, and heavy vehicle use. The ICRD uses multiple methods to temporarily fix road damage that is a result of our wonderful Michigan weather. This includes patching potholes with both cold and hot mixed asphalt, and applying preventative measures such as crack sealing and mastic applications.



Local Road Program

Roads in Michigan have been chronically underfunded for decades. There are numerous reasons behind this fact, but no matter the cause, Michiganders see the results – many miles of poor roads. This is especially true for local roads, which connect people from the primary road system to their homes and businesses. Ingham County has 432.76 miles of primary roads and 822.27 miles of local roads.

The primary and local designations play an important role in how much the road department receives from the Michigan Transportation Fund (MTF). Unfortunately, the MTF allocated for local roads barely covers the Ingham County Road Department's cost for routine maintenance such as snow plowing and pothole patching. In addition, under current state law (Act 51 of 1951), any improvements to a local road must have at least 50% of its funding come from a source other than the road agency. This alternate source of funding often comes from the Township, but it can also come from a millage, special assessment district, developments or other outside sources.

The Local Road Program is the Ingham County Road Department's solution to funding the muchneeded maintenance work on our local road system. Every year department leadership meet with each township to see which roads they would like to designate for work. Based on funding available and projects designated as priority by the townships, we come up with our annual road maintenance list.

This year we are happy to share that every township has elected road projects to help improve their infrastructure and in total the Ingham County Road Department will be working to improve over 100 miles of road.





In 2024, Ingham County is set for a transformation with the Ingham County Road Department's ambitious road construction projects across multiple townships.

Hagadorn Road and Sandhill Road Intersection (Alaiedon Township)

- Construction of a roundabout and road approach work in all four quadrants of the intersection.
- All traffic will be detoured to alternate roads via a posted detour. Local traffic will be maintained to residents within the work zone.
- Work began in April and is expected to be completed in September.

Holt Road from US-127 to Okemos Road (Alaiedon Township)

- Construction includes the reconstruction of the roadway by breaking apart the existing concrete payement and resurfacing with an asphalt pavement.
- All traffic will be detoured to alternate roads via a posted detour. Local traffic will be maintained to residents/businesses within the work zone.
- Work began with the main stretch of Holt Road (U.S.-127 to Okemos Road) on April 25th. The contractor estimates that this will take roughly 1 month to complete.
 Future work for this project will focus on the Holt Road and U.S.-127 interchange, however, this work will not
- begin until MDOT has removed their detour signage over the bridge.

Holt Road Bridge over Doan Creek (Leroy Township)

- Construction includes the replacement of the bridge superstructure (i.e., beams, concrete pavement and bridge railings), an adjacent large culvert and the road approaches to the bridge.
- All traffic will be detoured to alternate roads via a posted detour. Local traffic will be maintained to residents within the work zone
- Work is expected to occur from July-November.

Hoxie Road Bridge over Wolf Creek (Locke Township)

- Construction includes the replacement of the bridge deck and railings, quardrail installation and road approach reconstruction.
- All traffic will be detoured to alternate roads via a posted detour. Local traffic will be maintained to residents within the work zone.
- Work is anticipated to be scheduled for August-November.

Dietz Road Bridge over Red Cedar River (Locke Township)

- Construction includes the replacement of the entire bridge and reconstruction of the road approaches.
- This road is currently closed and will remain closed to traffic throughout construction.
- Work is anticipated to be scheduled for June-November.

Okemos Road and Central Park Drive Intersection (Meridian Township)

- Construction includes the replacement of the existing traffic signal.
- Traffic will be maintained throughout construction.
- Work is currently ongoing and should be completed in mid-May.

Waldo Road Bridge over Deer Creek (Wheatfield Township)

- Construction includes the replacement of the bridge deck and railings, guardrail installation and road approach reconstruction.
- All traffic will be detoured to alternate roads via a posted detour. Local traffic will be maintained to residents within the work zone.
- Work is anticipated to be scheduled for August-November.
